My grade school friends and I tried to imagine what life in the 21st century would be like. Would there be flying cars like George Jetson buzzed around in? Would folks vacation on the moon or Mars? Would robots do our chores? The 21st century seemed full of exciting promise. Some of those things have come to pass. There are robots that do chores. Drones may develop to the point that a person can fly in them. Some things we did not picture. Cell phones and the internet were not on the horizon. The closest thing to these things in our minds were the communication devices that Captain Kirk used to contact the Enterprise, "Beam me up Scotty!".

stories and personalities behind it and we will be exploring some of these this year. The Nicene Creed teaches the basic theology of the Church. It summarizes what the scriptures reveal about Jesus Christ. It holds the full divinity of the Holy Spirit before the Church. These things seem obvious to us now but they were in doubt in the fourth century. The fact that these things are obvious to us is because of the Nicene Creed.

Above everything else let's keep before us the initials A.D. following 2025. These initials stand for Anno Domini, meaning the year of the Lord. or more commonly the year of our Lord. There are some who want to do away with A.D. and replace it with C.E. or Common Era. I understand the thinking behind this sentiment. In a post Christian society shouldn't we avoid terms that point toward a specific religious faith? But Christians should be wary of this. The initials A.D. remind us that the history of the human race, including the rise and fall of empires, has unfolded the way that it has for the sole purpose of Christ coming into the world at a specific time and place. Think of the census that Augustus Caesar called for which led Mary and Joseph to go to Bethlehem where Christ would be born thus fulfilling the scriptures. The peoples of the world are under his care and providence. It is his justice, and wisdom that the world needs in order to live in peace. The world will find its culmination when Christ returns to establish his eternal Kingdom. All time belongs to him. The ancient liturgy of St. John Chrysostom begins with the words, "Blessed is our

Hallelujah Chorus

"His father tried to discourage his musical interests, preferring that he enter the legal profession. But it was the organ, harpsichord, and violin that captured the heart of young George Frideric Handel. Once, accompanying his father to the court of Duke Johann Adolf, George wandered into the chapel, found the organ, and started improvising. The startled Duke exclaimed, "Who is this remarkable child?"

This 'remarkable child' soon began composing operas, first in Italy then in London. By his 20s, he was the talk of England and the best paid composer on earth. He opened the Royal Academy of Music. Londoners fought for seats at his every performance, and his fame soared around the world.

But the glory passed. Audiences dwindled. His music became outdated, and he was thought of as an old fogey. Newer artists eclipsed the aging composer. One project after another failed, and Handel, now bankrupt, grew depressed. The stress brought on a case of palsy that crippled some of his fingers. "Handel's great days are over," wrote Frederick the Great, "his inspiration is exhausted."

Yet his troubles also matured him, softening his sharp tongue. His temper mellowed, and his music became more heartfelt. One morning Handel received by post a manuscript from Charles Jennens. It was a word-for-word collection of various biblical texts about Christ. The opening words from Isaiah 40 moved Handel: *Comfort ye, comfort ye my people...*

On August 22, 1741, he shut the door of his London home and started composing music for the words. Twenty-three days later, the world had *Messiah.* "Whether I was in the body or out of the body when I wrote it, I know not," Handel later said, trying to describe the experience. *Messiah* opened in London to enormous crowds on March 23, 1743, with Handel leading from his harpsichord. King Goerge II, who was present that night, surprised everyone by leaping to his feet during the *Hallelujah Chorus.* No one knows why. Some believe the king, being hard of hearing, thought it the national anthem.

No matter - from that day audiences everywhere have stood in reverence during the stirring words: *Hallelujah! For He shall reign forever and ever.*

Handel's fame was rekindled, and even after he lost his eyesight, he continued playing the organ for performances of his oratorios until his death in London, April 14, 1759."

John Chrysostom, Preacher Commemoration Day January 27

"Given the added name Chrysostom, which means "golden-mouthed" in Greek, St. John was a dominant force in the fourth century Christian Church. Born in Antioch around AD 347, John was instructed in the Christian faith by his pious mother, Anthusa. After serving in a number of Christian offices, including acolyte and lector, John was ordained a presbyter and given preaching responsibilities. His simple but direct messages found an audience well beyond his hometown. In AD 398, John Chrysostom was made patriarch of Constantinople. His determination to reform the church, court, and city brought him into conflict with established authorities. Eventually, he was exiled from his adopted city. Although removed from his parishes and people, he continued writing and preaching until the time of his death in AD 407. It is reported that his final words were "Glory be to God for all things! Amen."

The Conversion of St. Paul Feast Day January 25

"St. Paul's life-changing experience on the road to Damascus is related three times in the Book of Acts (9:1-9; 22:6-11; 26:12-18). As an archenemy of Christians, Saul of Tarsus set out for Damascus to arrest and bring believers to Jerusalem for trial. While on the way, he saw a blinding light and heard the words: 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting Me:' Saul asked, 'Who are You, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, who you are persecuting.' In Damascus where Saul was brought after being blinded, a disciple named Ananias was directed by the Lord in a vision to go to Saul to restore his sight; 'Go, for he is a chosen instrument of Mine to carry My name before the Gentiles and kings and the children of Israel' (Acts 9:15). After receiving his sight, Saul was baptized and went on to become known as Paul. the great apostle."

Confession of St. Peter Feast Day January 18

"The confession of St. Peter did not arise in the imagination of Peter's heart but was revealed to him by the Father. The reason this confession is important is seen in Jesus' response: "You are Peter (Greek Petros), and on this rock (Greek petra) I will build My church" (Matthew 16:18). As the people of God in the Old Testament began with the person of Abraham, the rock from which God's people were hewn (Isaiah 51:1-2), so the people of God in the New Testament would begin with the person of Peter, whose confession is the rock on which Christ would build His Church. But Peter was not alone (the 'keys' given to him in Matthew 16:19 were given to all the disciples in Matthew 18:18 and John 20:21-23). As St. Paul tells us, Peter and the other apostles take their place with the prophets as the foundation of the Church, with Christ Himself as the cornerstone (Ephesians 2:20). The confession of Peter, therefore, is the witness of the entire apostolic band and is foundational in the building of Christ's Church. Thus the Church gives thanks to God for St. Peter and the other apostles who have instructed Christ's Holy Church in His divine and saving truth."

Highlights of the Church Council Meeting and Joint Council Meeting December 19, 2024

An Update on the Shared Ministry between St John's Dubois and Loogootee

Meeting Attendees – Deanna Linne, Missy Cooper, Eric Cooper, Gary Moeller, Travas Eichmiller, David Schneider, Jillian Eckerle, Tara Eichmiller, Harold Eichmiller, Peggy Wiesehan, Deron Steiner, Angie Steiner, Duane Mann, and Barbara Prince. A meeting of both Councils and Finance Groups from each congregation, met on Thursday, December 19, 2024. The purpose was to address any questions, concerns, and financial aspects of the current Covenant of Shared Ministry between the two churches. Gary Moeller offered a prayer and Barbara Prince read a devotion prior to the meal and discussion followed.

The meeting was called to order by Tara Eichmiller. All members present agreed that the arrangement is working well. Our only concern was to ensure that Pastor Tim feels that the schedule is manageable. The topic of budgets was put on hold until treasurers from both councils can meet to go over salary and benefit options for 2025. Compensation was also discussed. Deron and Duane will speak with Pastor Tim in the next few weeks about his preference for how the current arrangement is working and if any changes are needed.
